- 6. The Monroe Center will identify needs, make enhancements to our building, and improve our technology.


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



- Average Daily Attendance in 2023 was 121.9 which is up from the 105.7 average in 2022, and exceeds the average of 117 individuals served in 2019, pre-pandemic. (A report from LeadingAge™ shows that nationally, senior centers serve an average of 88 people per day.)
- Participation in Center activities is tracked through the use of MySeniorCenter. Individuals who come
 into the Center select the activities in which they are participating each day. In 2023, activity units
 totaled 63,675 units which is up from 54,643 in 2022, and exceeds the pre-pandemic number in 2019 of
 61,666 units.





Monroe County Retired & Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) continues to operate under the sponsorship of the Monroe Center. In 2023, 298 RSVP volunteers who are 60 years of age or older provided **60,140** hours of service. It is quite impressive that so many volunteers continued to serve our County throughout the pandemic and are back full force.


The number of noon meals served in 2023 was a 15.6% over 2022 and exceed the pre-pandemic number of 21,002 meals served in 2019. The meals are home cooked, nutritious and remain a great value. The amount charged for members for the main choice alone remains \$3 during the week and \$4 on Sundays.

Participation

Total Hours at the Center increased from

86,864 in 2022 to 98,923 in 2023

The hours serviced in 2023 exceeded the pre-pandemic number of 97,384 in 2019.



The Center also measures the impact that participation has on individual's lives. The following was reported for 2023:

- ♦ 45.2% reported that their lives significantly improved since attending.
- ♦ 41.1% reported that their lives improved since attending the Center.
- \diamond 100% reported that they were satisfied or very satisfied with the services.
